DISPLAY OF CIVIL AIR PATROL INSIGNIA ON AIRCRAFT

1. The Civil Air Patrol insignia (blue disk with superimposed white triangle and with red three-blade propeller superimposed on triangle) shall be placed on the wings and fuselage of all aircraft engaged in official Civil Air Patrol missions. Any aircraft while displaying such insignia shall be flown exclusively by members of the Civil Air Patrol.


2. Insignia disks placed on wings shall be centered on the top side of the left wing and on the bottom side of the right wing at a point one-third of the distance from the wing tip to the fuselage. The diameter of said disks shall not exceed two-thirds of the wing chord at the point of application.

3. Insignia disks placed on the fuselage shall be centered on both sides of the fuselage at a point one-third of the distance from the leading edge of the horizontal stabilizer to the trailing edge of the wing. The diameter of said disks shall not exceed two-thirds of the depth of the fuselage at the point of application.

4. This memorandum is in no way to be construed as requiring the display of Civil Air Patrol insignia on aircraft engaged in Civil Air Patrol training activities, nor of limiting participation in such training activities to aircraft displaying said insignia, nor of preventing aircraft displaying such insignia from being used in non-official flying provided the pilot is a member of the Civil Air Patrol.

5. Wing Commanders are hereby requested to forward copies of this memorandum to all units under their Command for the information and guidance of all concerned.
