Subject: Operating Frequencies Civil Air Patrol Radio Stations
In the War Emergency Radio Service

To: All Unit Commanders

1. In view of the fact that all stations in the War Emergency Radio Service must operate within the frequencies specified in Par. 15.21 of the F. C. C. Regulations, and set forth in OCD Publication 2410 issued under January 19, 1943, entitled, "Federal Communications Commission Rules and Regulations Governing Civil Air Patrol Radio Stations in the War Emergency Radio Service," it is readily apparent that the transmissions of some stations might conflict or interfere with other types of stations in the War Emergency Radio Service.

2. In order to avoid confusion or interference, it has been agreed between the Office of Civilian Defense and the National Commander, Civil Air Patrol, that the Civil Air Patrol Radio Stations in the WERS will operate on the band from 115.2 megacycles to 116 megacycles. Therefore, the band from 115.2 to 116 megacycles will be considered the official frequency band for Civil Air Patrol Radio Stations in the WERS, and all equipment will be set up in such a manner as to operate thereon.
